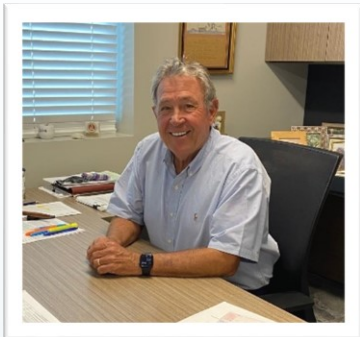

Project Spotlight: Australian Avenue Watermain Replacement

One of our best customers, Burkhardt Construction, called upon us once again for a high-profile project for the Town of Palm Beach. This contract was for the removal and replacement of an 8" watermain on Australian Avenue, from Lakeside Drive to South Ocean Boulevard. Johnson-Davis was excited to undertake this task and used this opportunity to showcase our superior skills and craftsmanship. "You're only as good as your last job." Motivated to do our best and desire to exceed the town's high standard for excellence, we broke ground.

Australian Avenue encompasses both residential and commercial properties throughout. In particular, the commercial properties were of great concern. It was essential that we complete our construction activities without negatively impacting local businesses. We were obligated to safeguard the daily operations for the island's Town Hall, the Brazilian Court Hotel (member of the Leading

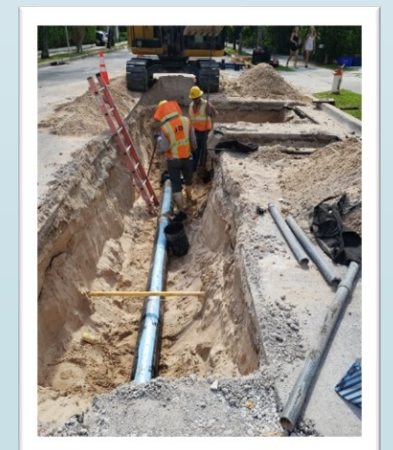
Hotels of the World) and it's award-winning restaurant, Café Boulud, to name a few. Keeping this prestigious neighborhood in mind, we began this assignment in the off season.

April through November, Johnson-Davis Inc. installed a mile of pipe. Separated into five phases, without the ability to work on any adjacent phase simultaneously, we encountered countless challenges. From the initial bidding to completion, numerous considerations regarding the current economy, skyrocketing fuel costs, and the supply chain issues to acquire materials had to be made. Vendors refused to hold quoted prices and there was no guarantee as to when products would arrive. Kudos to Burkhardt Construction and the Town of Palm Beach for preordering major components that we would later purchase. With no additional delays, Superintendent Joe Bagford along with Foreman Rene Hernandez and crew, hit the ground running locating the existing watermain, services, fire lines, and other utilities.

Collaboration between Burkhardt Construction, the Town of Palm Beach, and Engineer Kimley Horn was vital. When dealing with older systems, it is not uncommon to come across numerous conflicts. Rene and his crew experienced just that when existing pipes presented themselves but were not shown on the plans. Joe's extensive knowledge in underground construction along with his ability to problem solve came in handy. We worked as a team and minimized stumbling blocks. As a result, conflicts were handled in a timely, cost-effective manner. After the mainline was installed and passed inspection by the Health Department, Lenny Arce and his team came in to tie in all water services.

A special thank you to all crews involved in the completion of the Australian Avenue project. From Robens Pierre and John Lester's expert restoration efforts to our subcontractors Wm. D. Adeimy, R&D Paving, Rangeline Tapping Services, Connery Concrete and Steffen & Sons, we couldn't have done it without you!

Project Spotlight: 4101 S. Ocean Boulevard Highland Beach Drainage Improvement

The 4101 South Ocean Boulevard Drainage Improvement project in the Town of Highland Beach was undertaken by Johnson-Davis through its FDOT District Four Push-Button Drainage contract with the FDOT (Florida Department of Transportation). The scope of the project encompassed drainage improvements by means of constructing a 24" french drain system along the west side of A1A, including 3 structures, and servicing two new inlets on the east side of A1A.

With the drainage being constructed along the edge of the asphalt and in the bicycle lane, this project's greatest challenge was the maintenance of traffic (M.O.T.) logistic. A full lane of roadway was required to allow workers to safely install the drainage; this was accomplished by using flaggers to alternate two-way traffic during working hours. To add to the complexity of the M.O.T., a limited amount of storage/laydown room was available within the project limits. From past experience on other projects with limited work and storage area, the use of temporary lane control devices, i.e. temporary traffic lights, was proposed. This type of M.O.T. set up allows the contractor to occupy a lane of traffic, while alternating one way traffic on a 24-7 basis on the unoccupied lane. This solution allowed for a laydown/storage area within the lane of traffic being occupied, and the traffic set up would remain in place unmanned through the weekends. To accompany the traffic lights system, a Driveway Assist Device was required at all driveways/intersections within the lane closure area; this system directs vehicles entering the flow of traffic in which direction they can proceed (either left or right turn only). The proposal for the traffic set up, submitted to the FDOT and Town of Highland Beach, was very quickly approved. This expedited the construction of the project and eliminated the need for nightly work. Unknowingly at the time of the proposal, this traffic set up would then also be requested by the FDOT on another SR A1A project in the Town of Ocean Ridge.

Along with M.O.T. and other logistical challenges on site, this project also dealt with the same supply chain issues that the industry has been facing since the start of the pandemic. Johnson-Davis heavily relied on multiple suppliers for each aspect of the project to ensure all materials were procured and available for construction by the anticipated project start. Our forces mobilized the project on August 16th of this year and was substantially completed by September 21st, just shy of Hurricane Ian's arrival; final asphalt milling and overlay took place November 1st and 2nd. Overall, the project was delivered successfully, timely, and well within budget, with the cooperation of the FDOT, the Town of Highland Beach, our major suppliers and contractors, and Johnson-Davis' construction and management team.

Project Spotlight: Stonemont

South Florida Logistics Center 95 (Stonemont) in Ft. Pierce is one of Johnson-Davis Inc.'s largest ongoing projects. It features a myriad of installations that our Company is most renowned for (including fire line, watermain, force main, sanitary sewer, and extensive drainage systems) to accommodate the new construction of two logistic center warehouses and office buildings. The site covers an area of approximately 103 acres and will be a key feature to the ongoing business development along Kings Highway in Ft. Pierce.

Johnson-Davis Inc. crews have worked diligently in providing the best underground installation methods to contend with the development of the wetland area. Dewatering has been a challenge that our crews have been up to task with during our particularly rainy fall season. The project features an additional directional bore for the watermain access to public utility, offsite improvements to amend the drainage and streetscape of the adjacent Kings Highway and Orange Ave, and a newly proposed sanitary sewer Lift Station (MOPS). As proposed, the project will eventually include over 3 miles of drainage pipe materials and almost 2 miles of watermain pipe materials.

Our dedicated crews have done an excellent job in exceeding client schedules and expectations, delivering safe and effective installations over the past 5 months.

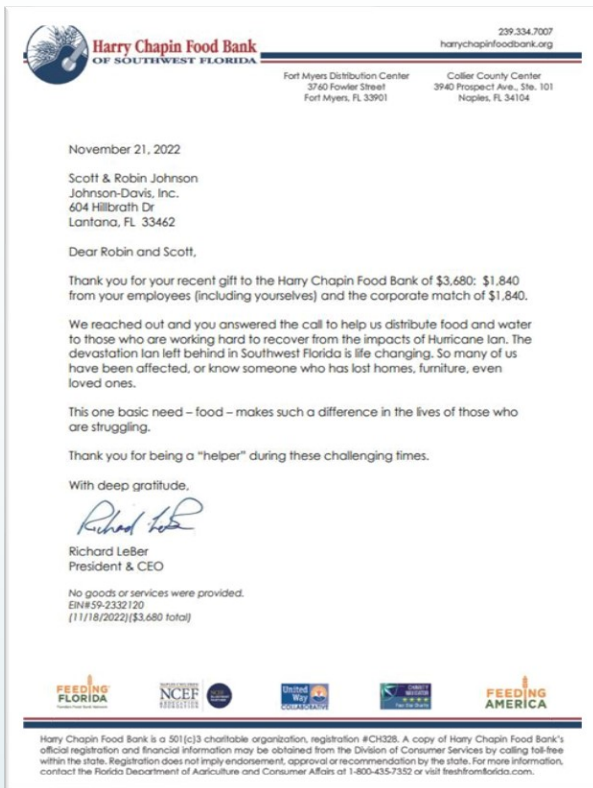

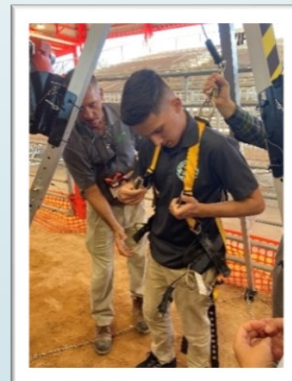

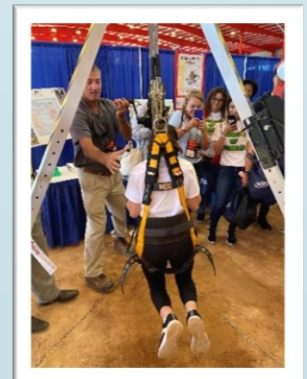

Safety Scoop

CONFINED SPACE RECOGNITION AND ENTRY

What is a confined space?

“Many workplaces contain areas that are considered ‘confined spaces’ because while they are not necessarily designed for people, they are large enough for workers to enter and perform certain jobs. A confined space also has limited or restricted means for entry or exit and is not designed for continuous occupancy. Confined spaces include, but are not limited to, tanks, vessels, silos, storage bins, hoppers, vaults, pits, manholes, tunnels, equipment housings, ductwork, pipelines, etc.

OSHA uses the term "permit-required confined space" (permit space) to describe a confined space that has one or more of the following characteristics: contains or has the potential to contain a hazardous atmosphere; contains material that has the potential to engulf an entrant; has walls that converge inward or floors that slope downward and taper into a smaller area which could trap or asphyxiate an entrant; or contains any other recognized safety or health hazard, such as unguarded machinery, exposed live wires, or heat stress.”

At Johnson Davis Inc we have trained our employees in recognizing a confined space and associated hazards. We have implemented a confined space entry permit program on the tablets which will give the foreman hands-on information to enter confined spaces safely and keep the entry team – consisting of an Entrant, an Attendant, and a Foreman at minimum, safe.

Hazardous atmospheres are deadly and carbon monoxide enriched areas are often referred to as *“the silent killer”*. For this reason, we have also invested in good quality 4-gas air monitors as well as confined space rescue and retrieval systems. Equipment which are essential for a safe entry.

Let’s stay vigilant, on high alert, and recognize confined spaces as a serious “silent hazard”
